If you haven't gotten involved in the construction yet, don't panic — there's still a great deal of work to do.

There are a few steps you need to do so that we can most effectively use your efforts on the work site.

First, those who plan to work on the house should fill out the volunteer skills and interest form. Copies can be picked up at the Habitat office in St. Patrick's Rectory, or at other locations. They should be filled out and returned to the Habitat office so you

can be logged into our volunteer database by Kitty Peterson. You also can fill out the form on the affiliate's web site, at <http://www.habitatseneca.org>. The information you supply on the web site is sent by e-mail directly to Kitty.

Work is being done at the site from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. The Building Committee tries to plan for the number of people and the skills they will need on any one day of work, and arrangements may change if bad weather or some other event arises.



Once your skills form is on file, you can help out the volunteer recruitment effort by calling the office to let them know what days you are available to work. For example, if you know on Tuesday you would be available the following Saturday, call the office and leave a message on the answering machine to that effect. Depending on the number of volun-

teers needed and the work that's scheduled to be done, you'll receive a return call telling you whether or not you're needed on that day.

You can always learn the latest information about what work has been planned by checking the web site. Other information is posted there as well, including pictures of the work to date.
